Other musical institutions have included The London College Of Music which has been at 47 Gt. Marlborough St. since 1896. In 1893 The London Orchestrial Association was formed to co-ordinate the huge number of professional musicians drawn to London in search of work.

The cellars of Soho have had many uses, some reputable, some nefarious, but in the mid-20th century if you walked the streets above some of these dark, dank, subterranean rooms you would have heard live music reverberating beneath your feet music that became a magnet for post-war London teenagers starved of entertainment
